IT'S ALL ABOUT SABBATH SCHOOL

A Transformational Sabbath School Class for Youth

Organizing Physical Space

The physical setting is always a challenge for the church-based Bible teacher. Most churches do not have specially designed educational wings. In many places in the world there just is no space and it is fortunate if the climate is a warm one and there is a shade tree on the church property. As the concept of sound educational practice takes hold in the church, however, more and more an informed case should be made to the board and/or conference of this important need.

Volunteer teachers can be informed about the importance of this and advised of strategies by which to lovingly badger the bureaucracy. But they must also be supplied information on how to adapt whatever they have into the best learning environment possible. It cannot be expected that the type of adaption necessary will "come naturally" to volunteer teachers. But, especially in a Bible "classroom" setting, it is vital that every student feel safe, comfortable, and included so that the learning experience can make the most possible impact on their lives.

Using Questioning and Discussion Techniques

In a well-run discussion, all students are engaged. The dialogue is not dominated by a few 'star' students, and the teacher is not simply waiting for someone to provide the answer he has been looking for. Unfortunately this description sounds like too many Sabbath School classes—especially when we honor the star students as a way of encouraging others to study their Sabbath School lesson.

If Sabbath School teachers had only one topic that they could study before becoming teachers, it should be how to ask good questions to lead to good discussion. "Research in education indicates that training teachers in questioning techniques can enhance learning skills in their students by encouraging their thinking from literal repetition of facts into deeper exploration through comprehension, application, and inferential reasoning.

A teacher can create more effective questions through the use of the following strategies, drawn from two sources:

- **Ask** open-ended questions.
- **Ask** follow-up questions.
- Ask extension questions.
- Wait for students' answers.
- Don't evaluate responses.
- **Use** questions to move the class toward the learning goal.
- **Use** clarifying questions ("Explain . . .").
- Ask "how" or "why" questions.
- Pose guestions before asking a student to respond.
- **Prepare** 12 to 15 questions for an hour's discussion.
- **Don't** settle for only one answer.
- **Develop** a tolerance for silence.
- Avoid answering your own question.

PERSONAL MINISTRIES - SABBATH SCHOOL'S PARTNER IN MINISTRY

HOLY WEEK EVANGELISM

Pastors in Hispanic Seventh-day Adventist congregations around the world help their members organize nightly outreach meetings during Easter Week or, as it is known in Spanish, "Semana Santa."

These evangelistic efforts are very important. . . . Men and women are empowered to lead out during Holy Week. This is a very sacred time for Catholics. The topics of the nightly meetings are very Christ-centered. Frequently, the speakers focus on the seven last sayings of Christ. The topic is rarely prophecy because the emphasis is on the Resurrection.

Holy Week is a "high time for evangelism." Special brochures are printed for inviting friends and neighbors. Bulletins focus on the chosen theme. Some churches rent a movie series on the life of Christ with a part shown each evening. The meeting also includes some music and preaching. Sometimes young people lead on the seven nights and conclude with a Passion Drama. No matter how it is planned, the lay people look forward eagerly to their time to share what Jesus has done for them.

This may seem a strange idea to Anglo church members, even dangerous. But Ellen White has written, "The words of Christ must be meditated upon and cherished and enshrined in the heart." (Testimonies for the Church, Volume 4, page 355) "What a theme for meditation is the sacrifice that Jesus made for lost sinners!" (Testimonies for the Church, Volume 5, page 316) "It would be needful for His church in all succeeding ages to make His death for the sins of the world a subject of deep thought and study." (The Desire of Ages, page 571)

Even if it is not predominantly Hispanic, your congregation could use Holy Week as an opportunity for outreach. This may be important if there are significant numbers of people with a Catholic, Lutheran or other background because they are used to a spiritual focus during this time.

The key to this whole approach is to give your church members an event to which they can easily invite friends, work associates, neighbors, acquaintances in the community and relatives. It is important to prepare a small, simple but elegant folder that members can use to give their friends something concrete announcing when and where the events will happen. It might also be helpful to place an ad in the newspaper with special events that other faiths will be announcing at this time of year.

Several approaches could be used:

- 1. Small group ministries.
- 2. A series of nightly special services at the church.
- 3. A Discover Jesus Seminar each night in a public auditorium or meeting place.
- 4. A "Celebration of the Resurrection" on Sabbath during worship, with appropriate music, Scripture readings, and sermon.

"INMATE SPIRITUAL COUNSELING" CURRICULUM SEGMENTS

"Inmate Spiritual Counseling" with an emphasis on Volunteer Prison Chaplaincy, is the new training curriculum for those who are very serious about updating their Prison Ministry skills. The 46-hour course is offered by the North American Division Academy of Continuing Education, and will be conducted in association with the International Institute of Christian Ministry of the General Conference Sabbath School/Personal Ministries Department, which has a direct relationship with Griggs University. Continuing Education Credit is a possibility for college credit in the future.

Curriculum Segment Highlights: Introduction to Inmate Spiritual Counseling VCHP.245

Description

This Module introduces the student to counseling situations germane to correctional settings. It summarizes Christian counseling concerns apropos to the behavior and feelings of inmates and the work of Correctional Chaplains, Inmate and Spiritual Counselors.

Overview

This course exposes the student to the fundamentals of communicating with inmates, as well as how to know them and to gain their confidence and respect. It delineates acceptable and non-acceptable approaches to conversing with inmates. The student will become familiar with Christian counseling techniques and the role of Christian Counselors to the incarcerated. Students will gain insights in the work of a Chaplain/Inmate Spiritual Counselor inside the fence.

Learning Outcomes

- 1. The student will learn how to know inmates.
- 2. The student will learn how to talk to inmates.
- 3. The student will be exposed to some of the hurting situations that inmates are exposed to.
- 4. The student will learn what Christian Counselor/Chaplains are exposed to in the Department of Corrections.
- 5. The student will be exposed to Christian Counseling techniques.
- 6. The Inmate Spiritual Counselor will learn the Counselor's responsibility to inmates.
