Over these nine lessons, you'll begin your time with reading a story about two kids, Holly and Matt, as they explore life, faith, and friendship. Holly and Matt go through real-life situations and begin to learn how to care for others, take care of themselves, and grow closer to God. Their stories will help you see how the Bible connects to your everyday life.

After the story, you'll dive into a few icebreaker questions and then transition into an interactive lesson where you'll open your Bible and explore a Scripture-based teaching that connects to the lesson's big picture.

Jesus didn't just teach people, but also showed them how to live. Being a follower of Jesus means using your heart, mind, and hands. That's why these lessons don't stop at reading. Each one gives you a chance to practice what you've learned. At the end of every lesson, you will find a special section with action steps you can try during that week. These might include journaling, acts of kindness, or spending time in God's word. All to help you grow in that week's big picture.

If you're going through this guide with your family or another grown-up, that's awesome. Love takes practice, and love also takes a community. Going through this Children's Edition together is a great opportunity to grow as a family, with a friend, or with a pastor. If you know someone who might enjoy learning with you, invite them to come along on this journey.





### PRACTICE IT
