

*1 - WHY GRACE MATTERS

Have someone read this short story aloud to the whole group.

Discussion

1. If that mother and child were asked "What Color is Grace?" what colors do you think they might have named? Explain your response.

Note: There is no right or wrong answer to this question. Accept any reasonable response. For instance: Red for the shed blood of Jesus. Blue for the ocean that covers my sins or for infinity because that's how far grace separates my guilt from me. Green for the newness of life that grace brings. Purple for the King of my life who died for me. Yellow for the sunny feeling that fills me inside. Gold for this most valuable gift, etc.

2. What color is grace for the children in your class or in your church?

If grace is not a brilliant color for you, pray that God will use this study to help you find His grace for your life. The study of grace we are starting today has the potential to change the way we teach children at church, changing the colors that they and we assign to God, ourselves and our church. This is why grace matters so much.

3. Why does grace matter to you? (Think about this for a minute and then share your response with a partner. Make a list of reasons why grace matters to you)

Song Cycle Activity—5-6 minutes

Try this if you are studying grace with a group of people. Or try it for family worship or when driving a long distance. Divide the group into two teams. Give yourself a 15-20 minute time limit. Teams take turns singing a hymn about grace. Once a team begins the song, everyone joins in. See which runs out first—the clock or the hymn ideas.

BIBLE STUDY:

WHAT THE BIBLE SAYS ABOUT GRACE

The Old Testament is full of grace, although it does not use the word very often. The New Testament has scores of references to grace—maybe hundreds, the apostle Paul being its biggest proponent.

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2. What Do Old Testament Stories Tell Us About Grace?

THE STORY OF THE FLOOD (Genesis 6-8)

Even before the flood, God had a plan to save the people. All who entered into His plan were saved. Even those who did not build the ark were invited inside. Grace pleads and is untiring in its invitation.

THE STORY OF ABRAHAM OFFERING ISAAC (Genesis 22:1-18)

God was trying to teach Abraham that the Lamb of God is the sacrifice for our sin. Offering Isaac could not have saved Abraham. Only the sacrifice God provides can save from sin.

THE STORY OF ABRAM PLEADING FOR SODOM (Genesis 18)

Grace is extended to all. But some "forfeit the grace that could be theirs." (Jonah 2:8)

THE STORY OF DAVID AND GOLIATH (I Samuel 17)

God uses the seemingly impossible and turns it into a victory. We all can rejoice in His victory as if it were our own.

You can add to this list of grace stories.

3. What Does the New Testament Say About Grace?

- a. Grace is God's solution to the sin problem (Eph. 2:8)
- b. Grace is a free gift. (Eph. 2:8, John 3:16, Romans 3:24) Nothing that I do can deserve grace or pay for it—I can just accept it as a gift.
- c. Grace is a gift of unconditional love.

"Nothing less than the infinite sacrifice made by Christ in behalf of fallen man could express the Father's love to lost humanity." Ellen G. White, Steps to Christ, chapter 1

"Grace means there is nothing I can do to make God love me more and nothing I can do to make God love me less." Philip Yancey







- d. Grace is from God; it is a gift of the Father as well as the Son. (John 3:16, 2 Cor. 5:19)
- e. Grace is a gift of forgiveness.
- f. God's grace saves me. (Eph. 2:8) He is victorious. I can share the victory—it can be mine, too.
- g. There is more than enough grace to go around. (Romans 5:17,20)

EXPERIENCING GRACE

A climber experiences the reality of the great height she has achieved when she stands at the summit and looks down at the valley where she started. To experience the height and breadth of grace, read the following Bible verses for each point.

- 1. GOD'S LOVE. God loves you very much. Romans 5:8
- 2. YOUR NEED. You have a life-threatening problem—you are doomed to eternal death. Romans 3:23 and 6:23.
- 3. Jesus is the WAY OUT of the sin problem. Christ died a death He did not deserve so that you can enjoy what is not deserved —life forever. John 14:6 and I Cor. 15:22
- 4. You can RECEIVE JESUS and His gift of salvation by praying the sinner's prayer—tell Him your need and invite Him into your life. John 3:16
- 5. Rejoice in the ASSURANCE that you are God's child! John 1:12 As God's child, you belong in His house. John 14:1-3 Grace is the name we give to the love and acceptance that prompted God to save us. He doesn't punish us or ask us to pay a penalty for our sin. He simply accepts us as we are, like the father in the biblical story of the lost boy.
